4:50 – 5:50 Group 1: Behind the Scenes at the North Carolina Maritime Museum - Beaufort

The North Carolina Maritime Museum in Beaufort reflects coastal life and interprets lighthouses and lifesaving stations, the seafood industry, motorboats, and more. Studies in marine life, science, and ecology are available for all ages. It is also the repository for artifacts from Blackbeard's wrecked flagship, including cannons, grenades, and more. Museum staff will provide an overview of the collection, as well as lead us in a sample activity to explore their resources.

Group 2 (stay on the bus): A Private Tour of Bonehenge Whale Center

The Bonehenge Whale Center is dedicated to the study and preservation of marine life, particularly focusing on whales. From its educational exhibits to cutting edge research on marine ecosystems and whale species, you'll get a private look at one of the most unique facilities in the state!

THIS is Core Sound: A Day on Harkers Island & Cape Lookout

"To understand Cape Lookout you must see it the eyes of people whose ancestors once lived there. Beyond the unspoiled landscape, are the remnants of a life here that we can no longer see – the history and people who once played here, children whose parents worried and worshipped through hard winds and cold winters on the banks, men who saved lives along the beaches, boys and girls who attended fragile one-room schools, who fished the waters and watched for whales, shipwrecks, and storms. This truth is fundamental to Cape Lookout National Seashore and it is the common thread that binds Down East together." (Source)

8:45 – 9:10 Arrivals & Continental Breakfast | Harkers Island Visitors Center | 1800 Island Road, Harkers Island, 28513

The <u>Harkers Island Visitors Center</u> & and <u>ferry</u> is a **35-minute drive from the hotel**. Please arrive no later than 9:00 am, in preparation for ferry boarding and a prompt **9:15 am departure**. We will have grab-and-go continental breakfast items for you by the ferry (sandwiches, bottled water, pieces of fruit, etc.) If you like a more substantial breakfast, you may want to build in time to pick up something in Beaufort. Restrooms are available inside and outside the Harkers Island Visitors Center. Ferries operate on a schedule; ours departs at 9:15 am and cannot be delayed for late arrivals.

While we have made ferry reservations for you, ferries are still public transportation and operate on a prompt schedule. Please make sure you arrive in time for a 9:15 am departure. These ferries are covered (but open) catamarans, and our truck tour will be in the back of flat-bed trucks with bench seating and smaller UTVs. 10:15 – 10:45 Arrival and Overview of the Morning | Cape Lookout Pavilion

Welcome to the true "Down East!" Karen Amspacher, one of the nation's leading authorities on America's maritime heritage and with deep roots on Harkers Island & the Cape, will provide a quick overview of our day's plans. Time will also be provided to walk over to the lighthouse (it is currently closed for climbing, however) and restrooms are available at the lighthouse visitor's center.

10:45 – 12:15 Truck Tour of Cape Lookout Historic Village & Seashore

South from the <u>Cape Lookout Lighthouse Complex</u> is the <u>Cape Lookout Village Historic District</u>, the uninhabited remains of a former village on <u>South Core Banks</u>. The 810-acre village (founded in 1887) includes the former Cape Lookout Life-Saving Station, the decommissioned Cape Lookout Coast Guard Station, the remains of a WWII Army coastal defense complex, as well as several former fishing cottages. Experience a one-of-a-kind exclusive adventure, as we journey into the unspoiled landscape of the Cape Lookout National Seashore to learn about the people who lived here, the natural landscape that is unparalleled in beauty, and the culture and heritage that still survives, despite pending threats.

2:00 – 3:00 Exploring Core Sound Heritage with Duck Decoy Carving

<u>Waterfowl carving heritage</u> runs deep through the history of the Core Sound area and is characterized by many aspects beyond the art of carving - from people, duck calls, artists, photographers, folklore, collectors, and more. We'll take some time to explore this rich aspect of Down East heritage, and even have some time to work on our own decoy.

OPTIONAL: Take some time to explore the <u>Core Sound Waterfowl Museum & Heritage Center</u>, characterized as "A gathering place for the heritage and traditions of Core Sound — a place to experience the people, place, and community." With several galleries and collections, feel free to stick around and learn (the Museum is open until 5 pm), or head back to the hotel and enjoy your free evening out and about in <u>Beaufort!</u>
